## 2.5 Mw Kenersys Wind Turbine offloaded in Gloucester

A 2.5 Mw Kenersys wind turbine is guided into Gloucester Harbor at dawn October 15th. The turbine was shipped to Portland, ME from Germany, then barged down to the Gloucester port.

The larger vessels like the Seabourne take a mooring at the DogBar Breakwater, and ferry in the passengers. The smaller lines, like the American, are able to pull up to the downtown Marine Terminal.
